

# From Our Past -

Recently meeting one of our Honorary Members, Roderick Andrew MacDonald, I had a chance to have a very interesting chat with him concerning our very own pipe band for which was known as the Scottish Society of Indianapolis Pipe Band. Pipe Major Roderick A. MacDonald was a bagpipe teacher in the Carmel, IN area until recent years. Our pipe band was established in 1985, under the SSI Presidency of Carter Keith, and continued until 1994. Some of it's founding members of the band were Ed Hale, Mike Hayes, Kelly Hayes, Mick Hayes, and Roderick A. (Roddy) MacDonald. The band proudly sported the Clan Hay Ancient tartan kilt, as it competed at many of the games in Indiana, Kentucky,

Tennessee, Ohio, Arkansas, and Illinois.

Originally known as the Clan Na Gael Pipe Band, which was founded in 1980, the band won 4<sup>th</sup> Place, Grade 4 in 1984 at the Midwest Mini Band in Chicago. In 1985, the band won 2<sup>nd</sup> place, Grade 4, at Carrollton, KY and 2<sup>nd</sup> place, Grade 4, at Gatlinburg, TN Smokey Mountain Highland Games. In 1986 the band won 3<sup>rd</sup> place at both Carrollton, KY and Oberlin, OH and 3 1<sup>st</sup> place wins at Gatlinburg, TN, Glasgow, KY and respectively 1<sup>st</sup> place Slow March, at Glasgow, KY as well. The Pipe Band competed with 12 other pipe bands at Columbus Scottish Festival on it's opening year. In 1987 the band featured Jean Redpath and in the following year, Fiona Ritchie.

From 1994 to 2001, the band continued as the Celtic Cross Pipe Band, still under the leadership of Pipe Major Rodderick A MacDonald until it was dissolved in November of 2001. The band supported many of the Burns Suppers in the Indianapolis area with the help and support of both the Scottish Society Of Indianapolis and the leadership and support of the Scottish American Club.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE SCOTTISH SOCIETY OF INDIANAPOLIS

Changes needed to the Constitution have been drafted and voted on by the Board of Trustees. Each Trustee will have a specific title; President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, 3rd Vice President, 4th Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Each position has specific duties to perform as outlined in the changes to the Constitution. As the person progresses up the chain of command the duties become more expanded. By the time a Vice President reaches the end of his term as 1st Vice President, he should be fully trained to absorb the duties of the President of the Scottish Society of Indianapolis. Will have the changes available to read at both the October and the St. Andrews dinners. The general membership that attend the annual meeting at the St. Andrews dinner on November 9, 2013 will vote to accept or reject these changes. A two-thirds affirmative vote of those active members in attendance is required to pass the changes.

# Scottish Recipe

# Coygimwch Dell Patagonia (Prawn Patagonia)

### Ingredients

570ml (1 pint) Thick Béchamel Sauce 450g (1lb) Creamed Potatoes 225g (8oz) Peeled Prawns

1 Small Cauliflower

110ml (4fl oz) Double Cream

110g (4oz) Caerphilly Cheese

1 tbsp Tomato Ketchup

1 tsp Garlic Salt

1 tsp Celery Salt

1 tsp Ground Bay Leaf

1 tsp Turmeric

1 tsp Mustard Powder

### **Cooking Directions**

Prepare the cauliflower and divide into florets.

Cook until soft, but still firm.

Divide and place into eight individual dishes or an oven proof dish.

Keep warm.

Combine the cream, tomato ketchup, garlic salt, celery salt, ground bay leaf, turmeric, mustard powder and a little freshly ground pepper.

Add to Béchamel sauce, mixing thoroughly.

Add the peeled prawns and the crumbled Caerphilly cheese and heat gently, do not boil.

Pour the mixture over the cauliflower and grill until golden brown.

Pipe creamed potatoes around the serving dish.

Servings: 8
