Clan Arthur Society



As with all Scottish clans the crest is the property of the Chief and may be borne by him alone, although in days gone by, the Chief's fighting men wore his crest on a leather armlet to identify their allegiance. This device gave rise to the modern clansman's badge - the crest worn surrounded by a belt signifying a clansman in servitude to the chief.

All clan members may wear the chief's crest encircled by a strap and buckle inscribed with their chief's motto or slogan. The strap and buckle symbols the membership to the clan and allegiance to the clan chief. Only the chief, chieftains, and armigerous members of the clan may wear the chief's crest without the strap and buckle surrounding it.

A person does not need to be a member of a clan society to be able to wear a crest badge. Any clan member has a right to it, not just clan societies and clan society members. According to the Court of the Lord Lyon, clan membership goes with the surname. Although, today many people who do not bear a clan surname do wear crest badges of their mother's clan, and anyone who offers their allegiance to a clan chief is a member of a clan (unless the chief decides to refuse that person's allegiance).

About the Crest

The Clan Arthur crest is formed from: "Two laurel branches in *orle proper*", more commonly known as a laurel wreath. In heraldic terms, the enclosure of the branches is recognised as protective.

The laurel wreath can immediately be associated with the Roman Caesars (as is "King" Arthur) and is easily recognisable as an empirical emblem. It is the symbol of the victor (the trait for which Arthur is acknowledged) and was presented to the Olympians of ancient Greece. Until recently the laurel wreath was still presented to the victor in Formula One motor racing on the podium at the Grand Prix. A wreath bearing purple fruits (as portrayed on the Clan Arthur badge) is representative of the highest honour and is from where the expression of "Resting on your laurels" is derived.

Laurel is more commonly known as the Bay Tree (*Laurus Nobilis*) from which the bay leaf is obtained. The ancient priestesses of Delphi burnt bay leaves to induce prophetic trance, nowadays it is more frequently used as an ingredient of traditional Indian cuisine. As an evergreen tree ruled by the Sun and Jupiter the Bay Laurel carries the light of summer into darkest winter.

About the Motto

The Clan Motto "Fide et Opera" ("By Faith and Work") originates from The New Testament of The Holy Bible - James, Chapter 2, Verses 14 to 28.

Within these three words lies the power of the clan. The combination of faith and work create an unstoppable force. It has been used throughout history by MacArthurs, and has described us throughout time. It has helped found corporations, industries and countries. It has made Presidents, and has even launched MacArthurs into space. If you ever see a successful MacArthur, analyze them and you will see our motto at work.

It should be noted that you will sometimes find MacArthur clan crest jewelry (hat badges, kilt pins, cufflinks, lapel pins, etc.) with the war cry "Eisd O' Eisd" written on the belt instead of the motto. This is incorrect. As the war cry should only be said by the Clan Chief, it should not be on a clansperson's crest. Only crests with the motto: "Fide Et Opera" are considered authentic and correct.

WHISKEY REVIEW



Dalwhinnie Scotch Single Malt 15 year is a highly renowned Highland Scotch. Highly reguarded as a citrus and a slight peat smoked. This Scotch is produced by Dalwhinnie Distilleries and is produced in a higher altitude distillery. Being a member of Diageo's Classic Malts series, it is appreciated for it's complex character and is considered worthy for beginners as well as experienced drinkers. It is best served with a small ice cube or a teaspoon of cold water and pairs well with a dessert such as bread pudding.

Nose: Honey with a slight nose of pear or apricot and a slight vanilla malt and a hint of peated smoke.

Palate: Slightly creamy carmel with pear or vanilla, apricot and of smoked peat.

Finish: A flow of the creamy carmel, slightly smoked with a feel of pleasant - fruit characters.

ANCIENT SYMBOLS-

The oak tree is an ancient sacred tree that is said to have "Dryads" or tree spirits living within. According to Greek and Roman Mythology, the oak tree was Zeus's sacred tree (Zeus was the king of the gods). An ancient Oracle Temple, the Oracle of Dodona, felt that listening to the rustle of oak leaves, the priest was led to interpret divine messages, that they had a power or voice oof the gods in them.

In Norse Mythology, "Thor's Oak – the god of thunder held a cosmic axis to the spirit world. Oak amulets were carved and worn for protection. The Druids sought out oak groves to hold spiritual rituals. They believed the oak was a potent sorce of wisdom and would eat acorns to gain insight into the future. The oak trees were used in folk medicine for their healing properties.

In ancient Celtic lore, the oak tree was referred to as "The Fathers of the Woods" and where they ruled the lands with his "Beech Queens". In Spritualism, the oak tree symbolizes **strength**, **endurance**, **wisdom**, **and stability**.

In Arthurianism, Merlin's Oak was an old Oak tree that stood formerly in Carmarthen and was connected to Merlinvia a prophesy that stated, 'When Priory's Oak shall tumble down, then so will fall Carmarthen Town'. Carmarthen was Merlin's Fortress.

The Oak tree is mentioned in the Bible and is a symbol of strength, endurance, and stability. It represents the Lord's righteousdness and a spiritually grown person rooted in faith much like an "oak of righteousness".



DRAGON LORE -

Unlike Irish and European dragons that fly, in Scottish Gaelic folklore, the large wingless creature known more serpent like dragon was known in Scottish Gaelic as a "beithir" and had a venomous sting instead of breathing fire. The dragon was considered a type of water spirit catagorizesd as a "fuath". The dragon is associated with mountainous areas, near lochs and rivers. Lore mentions that the sting can be prevented/cured by pouring water from a snake's head up on a wounded area. A dragon is associated with lightning.

Lore also indicates that if the dragon is beheaded, and the head is not removed far enough from the body, the parts can rejoin and be transformed back into the beithir. This can happen with snakes as well.
